Four in Hopkins Family Serving With Air Corps

Pierre A. Hopkins, son of Mr. and Mrs. P. Augustus Hopkins, of 104 Sedgwick Drive, has been advanced to the rank of captain in the Army Air Corps, his parents were informed yesterday. Capt. Hopkins is one of four children of Mr. and Mrs. Hopkins serving in the Army, all of them, including a daughter, Patricia, in the Air Corps. Capt. Hopkins is 25 years old.

Pilot of a B-24 Liberator bomber, based in Italy, Capt. Hopkins has been overseas since last August and served in North Africa before being moved to Italy. He was commissioned second lieutenant at Blytheville, Ark., in February, 1943, and promoted to first lieutenant in September of that year.

Capt. Hopkins was graduated from Christian Brothers Academy and attended Syracuse University and St. Michael's College, Toronto.

Lt. Joseph T. Hopkins, 26, was inducted into the Army the same day with his brother, April 10, 1942. He attended Officers Candi-

date School at Fort Oglethorpe, and was graduated as second lieutenant in the military police. He has served in the Provost Marshall General's office, and attended the School for Military Government in Fort Custer, Mich. He applied for transfer to the Air Corps last fall, and will be transferred to that branch to train for pilot in April.

Patricia Hopkins, 23, entered the Army Air Forces at Sweetwater, Tex., Jan. 9, for training as a Wasp. Miss Hopkins has had a pilot's license since 1941 and studied aeronautical engineering at Cornell University under the sponsorship of the Curtiss Wright Corp.

Pvt. Christopher Hopkins, 19, entered the Army July 30, 1943, after graduating from Christian Brothers Academy. He received his basic training at Indiantown Gap, Pa., after which he served in the Transportation Corps in Boston. He was transferred to the Air Corps in February, and is training at Greensboro, N. C.
